# The National Urban League Centennial

The National Urban League held its Centennial Conference in Washington, D.C. last summer to celebrate its rich history of providing community service and promoting economic empowerment.

The roots of the Urban League movement date back to the 1800s and early 1900s, when black people began to migrate from the rural South to the urban North in search of a better way of life. There they encountered poor housing, menial employment, inadequate healthcare, poor education and discrimination. It soon became clear that black people needed assistance to help them overcome these conditions. Ruth Standish Baldwin and Dr. George Edmund Haynes founded the Committee on Urban Conditions Among Negroes on September 29, 1910, in New York City. This group later merged with two other groups to form the National League on Urban Conditions Among Negroes. The name was subsequently shortened to the National Urban League.

Today, the National Urban League has more than 100 local affiliates in 36 states and the District of Columbia providing direct services that impact and improve the lives of more than two million people nationwide.

The Milwaukee Urban League was well represented by a large delegation at the Centennial celebration. MUL board members, Young Professionals and Guild members were joined by youth participants from the Pathways to College program, who participated in a national Youth Leadership Summit with hundreds of young people from across the country.

### Project Ready Workshops

The Milwaukee Urban League completed a 12-part workshop series with 60 sixth & seventh grade students at Wisconsin Lutheran College. The program, which uses components of the National Urban League's Project Ready curriculum, is designed to keep them motivated, focused on academic achievement and expose them to career opportunities that exist in today's workforce environment. The MUL believes that our children are our future, and to reach them early is the most effective strategy for success.

### National Achievers Society

The National Achievers Society (NAS) is a key component of The Urban League's Campaign for African American Achievement. The purpose of the NAS Induction Ceremony is to promote, encourage and recognize students for their academic achievement. The 2010 ceremony honored 283 students and was held at Christian Faith Fellowship Church (Bishop Darryl Hines, Pastor) conference center. The featured speaker was the Honorable State Senator Spencer Coggs, who represents the district.

## Back-to-School Health & Resource Fair

Our 28th Annual Health Fair last August featured 30 agencies and attracted 311 participants. Families had the opportunity to talk to healthcare and social service providers and get free health screenings, general check-ups and immunizations. Staff members distributed 450 free book bags packed with school supplies.

## Jobs for America's Graduates

A 27-year-old organization with a remarkable 94 percent national graduation rate, Jobs for America's Graduates is positively impacting the lives of tens of thousands of our nation's most challenged young people. The Urban League is in the third year of a grant from The Milwaukee Area Workforce Investment Board.

MUL's JAG specialists worked with 44 students at Washington High School and 69 students enrolled in the GED Options Two program at Hamilton High School. JAG students participated in an academic competition, and two students from each school were selected to attend the JAG National Youth Competition Conference in Washington, D.C.

## Volunteering & Networking Bring Employment Success

After 13 years working for an established Milwaukee corporation, Alfreter Bonds became another statistic of the unemployment crisis. She was sure that she had exhausted all avenues in her search for employment when she came to MUL's Workforce Development department. Employment Specialist Pinkey Buford observed that Alfreter had extensive work and education experience, and encouraged her to volunteer with organizations to increase her visibility. Alfreter enthusiastically agreed to volunteer at the Milwaukee Urban League while continuing to receive case management services and new employment contacts from her employment specialist.

Pinkey made several contacts with her new business partner, GE Energy Waukesha Gas Engines, on Alfreter's behalf. With a new resume in hand, Alfreter interviewed and was offered full-time employment. Earlier this year, she began her new job at GE Energy Waukesha Gas Engines with a competitive salary and comprehensive benefits package.

The Milwaukee Urban League's Workforce Development Services continues their solid track record of helping job seekers remove barriers to employment through job skills training and referrals to jobs that can support families.

## Employment Assistance Program

More than 1,500 participants in the EAP received counseling, job readiness training, as well as assistance with completing applications and securing job interviews.

Employment specialists provide continuous outreach and collaboration with local employers. Potawatomi Bingo, AirTran Airways, Wells Fargo, Wheaton Franciscan St. Joseph Hospital, UPS, Bryant & Stratton and Orion Security are just a few examples of the 56 businesses that rely on MUL for qualified job applicants.

Customized Job Fairs that match prospective employees to employers are offered quarterly. In 2010, the US Census Bureau, AJ Wright Co., UPS and We Energies were Job Fair co-sponsors.

The Workforce Development Department hosted an "Employers Appreciation Breakfast" in October for 45 business and corporate guests who assisted the Employment Assistance Program in job placement and training activities. During the breakfast, several clients who found jobs through the program shared their enthusiasm and experiences with EAP services.

## Persistence Leads to New Job & New Home

When Larry Watkins enrolled in the MUL's Employment Assistance Program in August 2010, he had recently arrived in Milwaukee from North Carolina and was unable to find a job. Employment Specialist Carmelita Perry discovered that these were not his only challenges. Larry was homeless and had additional employment barriers associated with his drivers license and personal history, but neither he nor Carmelita was willing to give up.

Using the computers at the League, Larry was persistent in pursuing every lead given to him. Finally he received a job interview, but did not pass the background check. He persevered and requested another interview with someone else in the company. After a six-week waiting period, Larry was hired by Cargill Co. as a meat processor. Carmelita and other MUL staff also worked together to find him a place to live. "Finding him a home is just part of our process," she commented. "He said repeatedly that he wanted to get where he could fit in, and he did."

## Apprenticeship Recruitment Program

Last year, 247 people participated in MUL's Pre-apprenticeship and Training Program, sponsored by the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District in partnership with WRTP/Big Step. Participants receive skills training and employment assistance for careers in construction-related trades such as electrical, plumbing, carpentry and steam fitting.

Through the Apprenticeship Recruitment Program's affiliation with the Century City project, a significant number of pre-apprenticeship trainees worked with professionals at a green deconstruction demolition site. This opportunity allowed the trainees to get hands-on experience with innovative techniques that will set the standard for building deconstruction demolition in the future.

## Developing Business Opportunities

Working with Milwaukee County, MUL's Capacity Building Project provided 17 workshops with certifications to 33 developing or new entrepreneurs. Course topics included everything from initiating a small business to its management. As a result of the 2010 program, four new businesses were opened, providing full-time employment to seven individuals.

## Success Through Advocacy

MUL is frequently asked to participate in community activities that directly impact the quality of life in Milwaukee. In 2010, those activities included:

### White House Community Jobs Forum

With the current economic and unemployment problems, President Obama asked communities across the country to host jobs forums and provide feedback on ideas for job creation and economic improvement. The Milwaukee Urban League hosted a White House Community Jobs Forum in January with a diverse group of organizations attending. The group submitted recommendations to the White House, including a suggestion to create temporary public service jobs to improve our infrastructure.

The jobs forum was also co-hosted by Community Advocates, UMOS, North West Side CDC, Citizen Action of Wisconsin and Milwaukee Inner City Congregations Allied for Hope (MICAHA).

### MillerCoors Urban Entrepreneur Series

The Milwaukee Urban League and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Sheldon B. Lubar School of Business are the local partners for the annual MillerCoors Urban Entrepreneur Series, a national business plan competition designed to assist young entrepreneurs in developing or expanding their businesses. At the awards program in Chicago last March, four winners received \$25,000 grants, and the grand prize winner received \$100,000.

### Safe Alternatives for Youth

Milwaukee County Board chair Lee Holloway established the Safe Alternatives for Youth Program in response to the tragic beating death of a man by a group of juveniles. The program funds safe, positive activities for youth, especially during the summer months. In 2010, more than 30 organizations received funds to provide activities for central city youth. Since the inception of the program, MUL has served as its fiscal agent. The SAY Advisory Board Committee chair is Dr. Joan Prince, vice chancellor for Partnerships and Innovation at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.
